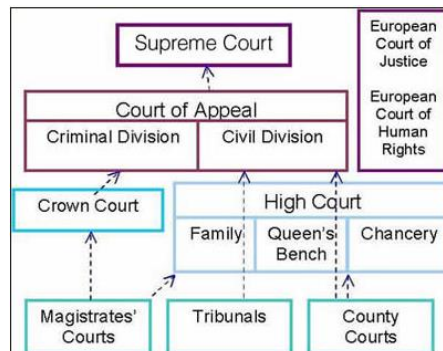
Key Legal Terms – use legal websites and your own knowledge to find brief definitions for these key legal terms. Make sure that you understand what you are writing.
